The only dog walking groups I know of are listed on my website. Which unfortunately is still a very short list. I am calling out to all dog walking groups who are happy to be listed on my website so


that potential new members can look for groups near them.



The Adventures of Lily



Mum goes for the hand-made cooked to order burger, topped with bacon and cheese, which she said is so delicious she doesn't share with us.


Mum and Dad also get a pint of diet coke and a large wine and with the meals comes to about £35.

Hello all, I am now 13 months old. My training is going very well. Stew says I am changing, I know I am here for a reason – to be a good Police dog.

I love having my nose down on a 'track', it could be a fox, badger, dear or rabbits. Stew makes 'monkey fist' toys for me, this is me with my favourite one in Shobrooke Park.



I have been on a three day 'assessment centre' for potential dog handlers at Devon and Cornwall Police headquarters Exeter, for them, like us, it is pass or fail. The candidates are male and female from Cornwall, Devon and Dorset. The course is to assess future dog handlers for their suitability to join one of the courses run by Devon and Cornwall Police. If they are successful they will be put on a list to join an initial General

Purpose Police dog course at a later date.


Stew says my training is becoming more earnest now. More on that later.

As part of my environmental training, Stew took me to the local hospital. As always Stew said, 'we will only be here about 15 minutes', never going to happen! Once the staff and patients see me – that's it! Lots of attention and fuss – I know it's a hard life, but some dogs have to do it – and that dog has to be me! It was a good experience for me, different floors and smells.

My training is progressing and I am really enjoying it - well, what dog wouldn't if it involves lots of barking without being told off! The canine development officer is focusing on my 'bread and butter' tracking. I am doing well, when the wind blows the scent off the track my nose makes adjustments for this and I follow the track to a successful find. The sleeve, oh! I love the sleeve! Stew says he feels sorry for the instructor wearing it, they often say, 'I really felt that!'. And, I won't let go.



My criminal work is great fun it's made that way by the instructors. I really enjoy building searching. An instructor will tease me with a toy, he will run into a building and hide. Stew has to try and keep hold of me, he shouts a warning before I start my search. Obviously I am barking a lot with lots of tail wagging. Stew thinks I sound like a seal! He says it must be the sardines or mackerel I have in my biscuits for breakfast. When I find the 'bad guy' I bark even more. Here I am cornering the 'baddy', he tried putting me off by banging on metal filing cabinets and shouting - I love it! Doesn't he look scared!



At the 'assessment centre' I was paired with an experienced ex Metropolitan Police dog handler (now with Dorset Police) as I am so strong he was the only one who could handle me. The candidates were closely monitored by the dog school instructors. They were judged on how they cared for the dogs under their charge.

The instructors looked at how they integrated with the dogs, playing, grooming, cleaning up our kennels, (Stew calls them cells – I was in cell six), basic tracking, building search and getting into a vehicle. They also had to work with licensed dogs. Here am I in the cell

block in cell six.



When I came home Stew took me for one of my favourite walks which involved several swims in the river. After that I was exhausted – I was so tired I couldn't eat a juicy marrow bone Stew gave me. I went straight to bed and slept.

Thank you very much Tigger for the gifts, the bandana and snacks.
I particularly like the hickory



smoked chicken snack – they are yummy!

I have to close now as I have to pack my bedding and my football. Alison and Stew are going away for a week, I am going to stay with the canine development officer and his dog Ella. It should be a fun week.

OLLY INVESTIGATES...RAISINS

Christmas is approaching friends. We all know what that means... food!

Now, I know what some of you are thinking, food is either tasty, yucky or boring. But I'm here to tell you that some food can be deadly.

I discovered raisins.

My mummy had left some at breakfast and had forgotten all about them. (She eats in bed at weekends you see, very lazy. Also if you were thinking muesli, you're wrong - it was rock cakes.)

That night, Saturday, she let me in to her bedroom and went to do her teeth. It was only when she got back to her room and saw the empty packet that she realised her mistake.

I'd eaten maybe 10 raisins.

A panicked Google search was done which didn't help, but luckily my insurance company gives a vet line number to get advice, and my mummy worries, so she phoned it and they told her I needed to go immediately to the emergency vet.

It turns out that the relationship between us dogs, grapes, their tasty dried forms and their toxicity is still little

understood. There are theories about the cause of the toxicity and also the dose relationship. You hear of dogs eating raisins with no ill effects and of other dogs dying.

At this point friends, I was oblivious. One moment I'm eating my dental chew, the next thing I know I'm being bundled out the house, into the car and into the yets.

Here the nightmare began.

First they gave me an injection to make me sick up everything I'd eaten. They then sorted through my sick looking for raisins (I like to think of this part).

They told my mummy that they'd found raisins and that there were two options.

1) They could send me home in the hope that they treated me quickly enough to prevent any damage.

2)They could give me the gold standard level of treatment.

I didn't know that "gold standard" could be a bad thing. I do now.

The vet explained that they couldn't be certain that the toxins hadn't already started to affect my body, or that they'd gotten all the raisins out. He said if there was any toxin still in my body it could cause

permanent damage to my kidneys resulting in kidney failure and death.

His proposal was for an immediate blood test to check the levels in my blood. I would then spend 48 hours with them on a drip being given intravenous fluids and activated charcoal. They'd spend the time watching for my poo to turn black (strange people these medical types) and give me another blood test at the end of the 48 hours.

My mummy agonized and cried about leaving me at the vets. I'm so scared of everything you see. But when the blood results were in, she was glad she had, because in that short amount of time the raisins had hit my blood. My creatinine level on admission was 157 umol/l.

On Tuesday she got the news that my blood test at 48 hours was good news and I could go home. My creatinine level had gone down to 103.

To help, the American Kennel Club lists signs and symptoms of raisin poisoning as:

- -Loss of appetite
- -Lethargy, weakness, unusual stillness
- -Vomiting and/or diarrhoea, often within a few hours
- -Abdominal pain (tender when touched)
- -Dehydration (signs include panting; dry nose and mouth; pale gums). A quick way to test

for dehydration is to gently pull up on the skin at the back of our neck. It should spring back immediately.

- -Increased thirst and/or urine production or diminished amount of urine or complete cessation altogether
- -Kidney failure (which can be

fatal)

In short friends, raisins: don't eat 'em.

If you do you eat any grape products, you need to seek immediate medical treatment I did win the 'worst timing' award – my mummy had just lost a heated argument about the hazards of having the food waste bin on the kitchen counter in reach of my tongue.

We can only home dogs within a 20 mile radius of Redhill in Surrey, as we offer lifelong support if needed and follow-up with dogs, and we are only small and volunteers!

Our principle role is the rescue and re-homing of unwanted and stray canines, undertaking veterinary

All potential new homes are checked thoroughly before the dog is released into their care and subsequent follow-up calls are made to ensure that the animal settles and to eliminate any problems that may arise.

We encourage the use of experienced foster homes during the re-homing process.

All our activities are carried out on a purely voluntary

basis and financed solely by self generated funds and your contributions, monetary or otherwise.

Our dogs are homed as family pets, most having had a bad start in life and we do not place any dogs in a home where they would be living outside or left alone for long periods of time.
