Blue-Green Algae Warning

The recent weather, rain, heat, sun, has unfortunately been great conditions for blue-green algae to grow.

Although it is called blue green algae, it can range from brown, blue, green and red.

It sits on or just under the water and can appear anything like a slimy slick all the way up to a mossy type of stuff.

It may look quite innocent but it is very harmful to both animals and humans.

Try to avoid any water that has this algae on it. Even if it seems there is only a small amount. It is not worth the risk of getting ill.

If you have been swimming in affected water, the common signs to look out for are:

- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Blood or black tarry poop
- Pale gums
- Jaundice (yellowing of eyes or gums)
- Seizures
- Disorientation
- Shock
- Excessive drooling
- Trembling or rigidity
- Blue discolouration of the

gums or skin

- Difficulty breathing

These are signs the animal has been affected.

Signs that humans have been affected include:

- Headache
- Rash
- Fever
- Stomach upset
- Seizures

If anyone thinks they or their humans have been affected by blue-green algae it is very important to seek medical advice as soon as possible.

If you have definitely been swimming in affected water but do not feel any illness or have signs of illness,. it is better to seek medical advice straight away to get advice and either not need it or get some initial treatment, rather than wait and get

really ill.

If you are out on your adventures and come across water with blue green algae in it then please let everyone know so that they can avoid it too.

The best way to stay safe is to not swim in water that is not clear.

Ollie and Nina and...



We are going on holiday soon and we like to make some treats to take to our holiday cottage. Well, we need fuel after Sir Fred of Warkworth inspects his castle, BOL! This pawscotti recipe can be eaten by dogs and hoomans. We don't know how long they keep fresh as they don't last long before they are down the bone shoot!

Cranberry, Almond & Orange Pawscotti

Ingredients

300g plain flour
1/2 tsp salt
2 tsp baking powder
120g sliced almonds
50g chopped dried cranberries
3 large eggs, beaten
200g caster sugar
1/2 tsp almond extract
Zest from 1 large orange

Method:

wire rack to cool.

- 1) Preheat oven to 160 degrees fan and line two baking trays with baking parchment.
- 2) Sift flour, salt and baking powder into a large bowl. Add rest of the ingredients and mix well.
- 3) Divide the mixture into four and roll into logs around 8 inch long. Place two logs on each tray, allowing room to spread. Bake for 25 mins and remove from oven. Allow to cool for 10 mins. Reduce oven temperature to 120 degrees fan.
- 4) Cut logs into slices 1/2 inch thick and place back on the baking trays, cut side down.5) Bake for 15 minutes and carefully turn over and bake for another 15 minutes. Place on a

Hello All, I am now 12 months old, I think I have reached the end of my growing, over the next five or six months I will start to muscle out. I am a very powerful young dog.

Since my last blog I have been on holiday and have had two formal assessments, overall I did really well, apart from one small glitch – but that was soon sorted out. I will explain more below.

Stew and Alison went away for a week's break, unfortunately as they went abroad I couldn't go with them. Stew and Alison both missed me and I missed them too, I was really happy to see them both when they came back.

Instead I went to Exmouth, as you know I love swimming in the sea, here is a photo of me swimming in the Exe estuary.

Just when you thought it safe to go back into the water!



My first assessment took place at Exeter racecourse, this involved the 'spooky man' scenario, chase and bite on a criminal and a long zig zag track. I was the first dog to do the 'spooky man', I had a harness and long line on — Stew doesn't use the long line when we go for walks as I am off the lead.

We had to walk down a narrow track, when we got near a bush a police officer jumped out! He was wearing a clown mask, a tarpaulin poncho and was carrying bags full of plastic, which made lots of noise. I took one look at him, ran back a few paces then took off! I should have barked at him! Stew recalled me and I came straight back to him, the instructor said this shows that I wasn't scared of the 'spooky man'.

He also said when I ran I could hear the long line making a noise behind me, I thought the 'spooky man' was chasing me. Stew couldn't believe it – he thinks I am infallible!

I did the same assessment two days later and I sailed through it – Stew was very relieved.

The instructors were banging lumps of wood on the tables, throwing plastic dustbins and office chairs around the rooms. An experienced dog handler sat in the corner of one of the rooms to see how I reacted, I went towards him and saw he was no threat and carried on.

None of this fazed me – in fact the canine development officer said I had 'made his day'.

When I was out for a walk recently a RAF fighter made a low pass over me – it didn't bother me.
Also I was out in thundery

weather, again it didn't bother me. Here are Stew and I on a very hot day taking five against a hay bale.

Stew takes me on regular visits to the local primary school and the children and staff are always happy to see me. Here is a nice photo of Stew and I with some of the children.




Stew has arranged for a Police dog team to visit the school in

TIGGER INVESTIGATES...CAGES

I know there is a big discussion regarding the use of cages or crates as they are also known as. Or in my case... my 'shed'.

Some animals swear by them and some break out into a cold sweat at the thought of them.

Whichever side of the fence you sit, it is vital that they are recognized as the vital tool for those animals that do need them.

Sometimes they are a blessing during the early years as a protection from teething, shred everything they can get their jaws on, puppies or stressed out new members of a family.

For anyone that has never used a cage before and are considering getting one there are a few simple but very vital rules about introducing one into the home.

Get the correct size cage

I see so many cages that are too small for animals and watch as the humans wonder why it is never used.

Yes dogs curl up to sleep. That is only sometimes. I, like a lot of pals prefer to spread out as much as possible.

The cage must be at least big enough for you to lie down with your legs stretched out and high enough for you to stand up without ducking.

The cage must be seen as a safe space.

To achieve this, the cage must always be placed with the door open at all times so that you get used to going in and out without fear of being trapped inside.

You must not be disturbed by inquisitive small humans or even adult humans trying to say hello. They must learn to wait for you to leave the cage before they try to interact with you.

Allow your human to add the odd treat from time to time so you get used to going in and out.

Tell your humans never, and I cannot stress this enough, never use the cage as a source of punishment or as a way to exclude you from the rest of the family as a 'time out'.

Fitting out the cage.

Get your human to add loads of blankets to start with as replacing or washing some or all of them is easier after accidental toileting or over enthusiastic digging rips any.

Have some toys that are safe for you to play with unsupervised.

Get your humans to add some blankets or sheets to make it into an inviting cave. This will make you feel more secure and protected and also protect you from any draughts.

Strangely enough I have never seen many cages fitted out like mine. A lot of humans place blankets and sheets on the outside, but I also have them draped on the inside to further remove the feeling of a cage. Plus it is a lot more comfortable leaning against material instead of bars.

The early days

During the early days of having the cage it may take some time and patience for you to actually use it.

Even then, being able to close the door can take more time to achieve without stress. It is important that you and your human takes the time needed to achieve this successfully.

Removing the cage

Once you are totally settled into your home some pals stop using their cage completely, as I did. Your human can try removing the cage to see how you cope. Make sure they do not get rid of the cage until they are sure you are finished with it completely.

PALM OIL WARNING

There are a number of reports of palm oil washing up on Norfolk, Cornwall and Wales beaches.

Palm oil is a very dangerous thing to animals. Please make sure your humans keep you away from any palm oil that has washed up on the beach. Now depending on what contamination it has come across during it's travels, will depend on what it actually looks like on the beach.

It can appear on beaches as a white, yellow or grey jelly type mass or solid lumps, sometimes mistaken for washed up

polystyrene, or even like chalk like lumps.

PRODUCT REVIEW - MAGNETIC DOOR CURTAINS

My human bought a magnetic door curtain/screen from a local well known discount shop.

Product:

magnetic door screen

Cost:

£2.49

Date Bought:

August 2019

Brief Description:

They are a pair of net curtains that you fix to a door opening. The two curtains are joined by several magnets.

Fitting them:

Do not be fooled.

They look innocent enough and quite easy to install. Read on...

They come with 6 Velcro strips and a box of pins.

There is also a one sheet guide that consists of a few basic drawings and vague directions.

I was a bit puzzled by the Velcro strips and pins, however I continued to direct my human to put them up.

The first thing that becomes clear is that they are much bigger than the size of the door.

Does my human cut them to size or do a series of folds to make them fit?

We went for the fold and fit to start with using the Velcro strips.

Review

For the first few days I was very wary of them. So my humans had to get up to let me in and out.

After a few days I still needed to be let out but could come back in myself.

The clicking of the magnets snapping back together was the main reason I was having issues.

Pretty soon I was able to run in and out without any problems, sort of BOL!

The sticky back Velcro strips were starting to fail a bit after about a week so my human tried t use the pins provided. They are not the easiest to stick into the door frame. Plus when I push trough the net, the net seems to just pull away from them very easily.

I must admit we are still having a few teething problems.

One example is that I ran indoors like a tornado and tore through the kitchen and arrived in the middle of the sitting room looking like a B movie ghost draped with sheets!

I thought it was funny but my human didn't appear as

amused. BOL!

Rating: 3/10 Paws

As an alternative to having nothing, the net does a good job of keeping the flies out, well most of them.

However if you intend to use the doorway, be prepared for a lot of fiddling around to re-hang the curtains several times a day.

The curtains are starting to look very shabby along the bottom and at the sides where they have continually come away from the door frame while going through it.

We are continuing to struggle along with it until we can find the plastic strips version to see if that works better.



RAYSTEDE CENTRE FOR ANIMAL WELFARE

Raystede Centre for Animal Welfare East Sussex BN8 5AJ

About:

In the 1930's a lady called Miss M Raymonde-Hawkins purchased a cottage with a small patch of land just outside of Lewes in East Sussex.

A former headmistress with a deep compassion for animals, she left the education sector to establish Raystede as an animal charity in 1952.

In the early days the charity was based in her cottage and back garden. But right from the start she pledged to

provide facilities that were equal to or better than existing animal rescue centres.

Fast forward six decades and the vision behind Raystede Centre for Animal Welfare remains as strong and impassioned as it did when Miss Raymonde-Hawkins began her campaign to give unwanted and abandoned animals a better life.

Today the site has expanded across 43 acres where they care for over 2000 animals a year, rehoming over 1000 animals and providing sanctuary to even more.

Raystede are one of the most diverse rescue centres in the UK because they care for so many different species of animals.

They even have a dedicated charity shop where you can bag a bargain and a cafe where staff bake fresh cakes every day.

Although Miss Raymond-Hawkins was a hero in her own right, Raystede has always been about its supporters.
