BUYING A CAT OR DOG

If you buy a pet dog or cat, it's important that you make checks to help combat the illegal trade in pet animals.

Some dogs and cats for sale in the UK have been imported illegally from abroad. This puts the health and welfare of the animals and the general public at risk.

Dogs and cats that are illegally imported for sale or rehoming may be:

 carrying serious diseases that could spread to other pets or people too young for import

-transported in inadequate conditions

- at risk of behavioural and welfare issues due to poor breeding and rehoming

- without the necessary health preparations for import

- advertised in a way that misleads the buyer on the animal's history, breed or pedigree

If you find that your new pet has been imported illegally, you may have to pay for costly quarantine and veterinary bills.

Buying a cat or dog guidelines

Follow these guidelines to make sure you help combat the illegal trade in pet animals. If you plan to buy a cat or dog:

 consider getting a rescue animal from a reputable UK rehoming organisation – you can check if the organisation is a member of the Association of Dogs and Cat Homes

 buy your animal from a reputable supplier such as a Kennel Club Assured Breeder – advice is available from the Dog Advisory Council, Dogs Trust, Kennel Club, PAAG and RSPCA

view the animal and its documentation before you buy
if it was born outside the UK it must have either a pet passport or a veterinary certificate

 ask to see the local authority licence details for commercial dog breeders

 licensed dog breeders must show puppies with their mothers to prospective buyers - speak to your vet, if you have any doubts about an animal

Buying a puppy or a kitten

If you plan to buy a puppy or kitten:

- read RSPCA and Animal Welfare Foundation information

- always see the puppy or kitten with its mother and any litter, and if possible, in the location it was born

- never buy a puppy or kitten younger than 8 weeks old

Raising concerns

Contact your Local Authority Trading Standards if you're concerned:

 about the health or welfare of dogs and cats advertised for sale

 you may have bought an illegally imported pet

NEWS FROM DORIS - THE ROVING REPORTER




Hey pals and a Happy New Year to you all.

they don't want to communicate face-to-face or vocally, they simply leave behind a few fragrant messages!




You and Your Border Terrier - By David Alderton

Hydrotherapy, or water therapy, is the use of water (hot, cold, steam, or ice) to relieve discomfort and promote physical well-being.

What to Expect From Treatment Sessions

- be showered to remove any dirt or debris from its coat which could enter the pool or treadmill
- be fitted with a lift jacket or harness to provide the hydrotherapist with control over your pet during the session and to provide your pet with additional buoyancy
- receive an individually designed treatment program designed to specifically address your pet's needs
- be monitored closely by the hydrotherapist to ensure it receives the best possible treatment on that day
- be showered and dried after the treatment session booked in for its next session, and advice provided on your pet's progress and the next course of action

TIGGER INVESTIGATES...HYDROTHERAPY (CONT.)

How Long Does a Treatment Session Last?

Each patient will be allocated a 45 minutes session to allow time for the health check, showering and drying, the actual treatment itself and time for discussion and questions.

Treatment length will depend on many factors including: what the patient is being

treatment for

- what general condition the patient is in
- how the patient behaves during the session
- if it is the patient's first treatment or not
- how the patient responded to its last treatment
- any changes that may have occurred since its last treatment

That said most patients will spend a maximum of 15

minutes swimming in the pool. This will be made up of 3 blocks of activity followed by a rest period between each one

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AFTER THE RAINBOW BRIDGE



There is now a space in the human's heart where we lived. It may be the huge space that was once our bed, the now clean floor that used to be cluttered with toys and half shredded goodness knows what, the sofa that now seems too large to sit on or the meals they eat that no longer have to be guarded or eaten in such a way as to make sure there is enough to share.

The human now yearns for one more spilt cup of coffee, shredded newspaper they had not read yet or another moan at walking in the rain.

They say life goes on.... but in reality is does not. It is frozen in time with the human's mind reliving the last moments they saw their companion, their rock, their friend.

Whether it was expected, sudden or a long slow process to the final moments, the feelings are still there, the vast cold emptiness inside and the huge knot in their stomach. Humans without animals do not understand but those that have suffered loss of an animal do understand.

They quietly mourn at the fear of being told they are being silly as it was JUST an animal. We know we were more than JUST an animal. We were their companion, their muse, their best friend and most importantly we were family.

We need to also think about other animals mourning about our passing over the Rainbow Bridge. All animals know and understand loss and mourn too. Mourning animals can stop eating, cry and in some cases act out in frustrated bereavement.

It is a difficult time with a lot of difficult decisions. Does the human get another animal? Mourn and go on without another animal? One thing they must not do, is to try to replace the animal that crossed the Rainbow bridge. They can fill the gap in their life, but never replace what they had with that animal.

How long should a human wait to get another animal? That depends on the human. Some can carry on and decide to wait before getting another animal. Some cannot function, move forward or even eat with the space in their lives and get another animal as soon as possible.

Whatever the human decides, there are no right or wrong answers as it is all down to how the human feels.

One thing to consider if a

human gets another animal after we have crossed the rainbow bridge is that a few days after getting the new animal they may feel they have made a huge mistake and even for a split second almost reject the new animal.

Even the mourning animals may attack or try to reject the new animal.

The human and mourning animals needs to know these are false feelings and it is part of the mourning process. They may push the new animal away but the new animal can feel their loss and will try to comfort the human.

The new animal never met previous animal but they know they were there.

The humans and mourning animals need to bring the new animal closer and start building a bond like they had with us.

Whatever the circumstance tell the humans and mourning animals that have suffered a loss or are preparing for a loss of an animal – speak out. They are not being silly. They have lost a member of their family and need a shoulder to cry and a sympathetic ear to listen...

If you have suffered the loss of an animal and need to talk to someone, contact your local vet who may have advice or know of local councillors or groups to get support from.

Am Politician is a restaurant and pub on the small, remote Island of Eriskay in the Outer Hebrides. It is named after the SS Politician, a cargo ship which ran aground in 1941. The ship was carrying 264,000 bottles of whisky and stories of the islanders who helped themselves to some of the whisky and hid it from the Excise men was immortalised in the book and film Whisky Galore.

There are artefacts from the ship in the pub which the bar

staff are more than happy to show you: a flare gun, machete, Jamaican dollars and two bottles of whisky.



Dogs are welcome in the bar area of the pub, there is also a beer garden. I was given a bowl of water and a handful of treats which very quickly disappeared, (the treats, not the water, BOL!). I was made a fuss of by the bar staff but not too much as I'm a timid girl.



Dad ordered as always the fish and chips (yippee!) and a soda and lime. Mum had the vegetable curry which is vegan and she treated herself to a cognac.
