Sickness bug affecting dogs in the UK

There has been a worry that there is a strange sickness bug spreading throughout the dog community in the UK.

Some are reporting doom and gloom while others are just downplaying the whole thing. The main problem is that social media and communication has increased exponentially over the last few years. So animals in one part of the world can mention being ill with something and other dogs in a completely different part of the world can report the same symptoms. So does that make is a superbug or just two isolated illnesses ?

So is there a super bug affecting dogs?

To be honest, the professionals are not sure yet. There are cases of a more determined sickness bug being reported in the UK, but as for being more reports of a 'super bug', there is just not enough information or evidence in reported cases.

The symptoms start off looking like a very normal bout of gastroenteritis, or stomach bug.

Gastroenteritis is a term used to describe an infection or irritation to the gut.

It is very hard to decide in the early days if or why we have an upset stomach, lets face it, the moment our humans turn their back we can get hold of and swallow all manner of weird and not so wonderful things.

When is an upset stomach more than an upset stomach?

Normally when we have 'normal' stomach upsets we may be sick once or twice, be a bit loose in the poop bag department, off our food and just generally feeling sorry for ourselves for about 24 to 48 hours.

When should we seek medical assistance?

First of all your humans know you better than anyone, so if they feel you are not yourself they should be able to make that decision.

Similarly, if you are already on medication for a long term illness then medical advice should be sought earlier.

Is there any difference to watch for in the current sickness being reported? There are some points to look out for so that your humans can get medical advice or assistance as soon as possible.

Things to watch out for:

- Projectile vomiting about 5 times in 12 hours. Not just our normal barf from when we have eaten grass or something too quickly, they mean proper putting our back into it barfing.

diarrhoea . Not a bit soft and squidgy, more bum gravy type.

- Tiredness, dullness and just plain feeling sorry for ourselves.

- Loss of appetite.

- When the sickness /symptoms have lasted more than 48 hours.

What should we do if we think we have got the symptoms above?

Get in touch with your vet for advice. We may need antiviral or anti sickness medication or even antibiotics. If we get really dehydrated, we may even need to go on a drip.

The good news is that all of the dogs I have heard about have gone on to make a full recovery. So do not be unduly worried and make sure you look after yourselves.

- By Nikki & Richard Attree


When petty criminals 'Flash Harry' Smith and Jack ('The Lad') Jones start nicking dogs, they soon realise they've bitten off more than they can chew ...


Nobody's Poodle - By Nikki & Richard Attree

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In the Kitchen

Article By: Fred and Tess We thought our baking needed some fine tuning on the presentation, so we ordered some doggy cutters (sorry for using your bank card Mum! BOL!).

Apple Paw Puffs

Ingredients:

240g white flour 60g applesauce (sugar free especially for spaniels, we are hyper enough! BOL!) 60ml vegetable oil 180ml water 30ml honey 1 egg 1/2 tbsp of ground ginger 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda

Method:

1. Preheat oven at 180 fan.

2. In a large bowl, mix all ingredients together. Knead the dough on a floured surface and then roll out the dough to 1/2 inch thickness.

3. Using our brand new paw cutters, cut shapes and place the shapes on a baking sheet 1 inch apart.

4. Bake for 10 minutes then turn the oven off and leave the puffs in the oven for 1 hour to harden.

These will keep for two weeks in a sealed tub in the fridge or freeze for future use (though defrost them first, BOL!).

Storage:

We don't know how long they keep fresh as they don't last long before they are down the bone shoot!

animal behaviour problems. Working with client to modify pet behaviour.

Common problems seen in pets:

CATS: Inappropriate /urine Spraying / Marking.

DOGS: Jumping up, lead pulling, poor recall

PARROTS: Feather puling, aggression

Rabbits: Fur pulling, aggression towards owner

Depending upon the problem behaviour and causes discussed, an initial management plan is verbally explained. This further leads to a subsequent comprehensive, written report where management of the animal and behaviour problems are fully explained.

A consultancy normally lasts between 1 and 2 hours where a full history is taken on the first appointment.

Also offered, depending upon the level of consultancy package chosen, is a 3-month post consultancy support period which is given via telephone or in writing. I also run puppy socialisation and training group classes or individual classes, adult dog training and socialisation classes also on an individual or group basis.

The adult classes are designed to help with problems such as dog to dog reactivity, dog to human reactivity, lead pulling, recall etc.

They are also designed to give your dog more confidence and to teach them so more advanced and fun behaviours.

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TIGGER INVESTIGATES...MUZZLES

Picture the scene, you are walking down the street and suddenly in front of you there is a human walking in lead with their dog. The dog has a muzzle on, what is your first thought?

That is why so many dogs are embarrassed or feel they are pre judged if they have to wear a muzzle.

First of all lets look at types of muzzles. Well I could write a whole book on muzzle, so I will generalise to two actual types. Day to day use muzzles and short use muzzles.

Short use muzzles are the material cone sort of shaped ones that hold the dog's mouth closed.

These should only be used when a situation arises where humans need to get near to a dog. Such as emergency care at a veterinary practice, during bandage changes or nail clipping etc. These muzzles must not be used fro a prolonged length of time as the dog cannot breathe or cool down properly, and is unable to eat or drink.

Dayt o day use muzzles has the greatest range of models and types. They are all basically basket type muzzles that allow a dog to open their mouth and breathe and cool down properly. They can also eat and drink while wearing them.

Day to day muzzles range so

much as they are made from various materials and depending on the breed of dog, can be in all shapes and sizes to fit the dog's mouth.

Why would a dog need to wear a muzzle?

- Some countries require dogs to wear muzzles until they have passed a behaviour course to assess them. This does not mean the dog is dangerous while it is muzzled, it just shows it has not finished its assessment.

- Breed specific muzzling is a government requirement to muzzle all dogs of a certain breed, regardless of the individual dog actually being aggressive or not.

- Illness can be a reason for wearing a muzzle. Perhaps the dog has a wound they cannot resist giving a sly lick or nibble to when the human is distracted.

- Scavengers have to wear muzzles as they tend to snack on anything and everything they can get their paws on. In some cases the more rotten the better. Apart from being a disgusting habit it can lead on to sickness and rather unsavoury poop bag episodes.

- Poop eaters. Well what can I say, it is self explanatory what they do. They feast down on all manner of poop. From rabbit droppings all the way to horse poop, with a quick munch of everything else they can get to munch on.

- Special diets dogs sometimes wear muzzles because some humans make it their life's work to shove random treats and foodstuff into strange dog's mouths without checking for food sensitivity or even permission.

-Over excitable playing dogs. Some dogs get over excited while playing in a group and may play nip. The nip itself may not cause injury, but it could escalate things with another dog that takes exception to being nipped. So a muzzle is used to err on the side of caution.

- Nervous dogs could wear a muzzle. They could be nervous of noise, crowds, traffic, other dogs... the list is endless. This does not mean the dog is aggressive. It just means that they are frightened.

- Finally the 'aggressive' dogs. It will be a rare day when you actually come across a real life aggressive dog. Their humans will make sure their whole life and walks out and about will be away from most common places to find other dogs and their humans. Their whole life will be dedicated to ensuring a safe environment for the dog and ensure there is adequate safeguards in place.

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TIGGER INVESTIGATS...MUZZLES (CONT.)

The section most humans think of, but it is probably the least likely reason. So please remember, just because a dog wears a muzzle doesn't mean its nasty!

One of my good pals, Fergal, wears a muzzle. Here is a brief word from him about muzzles.

As many of you know that I, Fergal, wear a muzzle when out in public, I gets scared of all sorts of things, mainly off lead dogs, cyclists and jogger, my reaction to it all is to bark and lunge, so I wear a muzzle just in case a dog runs at me, or a jogger or cyclist surprise us, better to be safe than sorry.

Please educate your children without telling them that a dog in a muzzle is nasty, maybe say its scared of things, or that it eats poo!

As I sell many muzzles to dogs

that aren't reactive, they just eat poo!

Also if you see an on lead dog (muzzled or unmuzzled) and the human asks if you would mind calling your dog back and holding their collar or putting them on lead, please respect this, they aren't doing it to be a pain, they are doing it to protect their dog and stop everyone's walk from being ruined by an incident that could be avoided. We don't care that your dog is friendly or wont come near , we care about our dog and it not getting stressed or upset.

My human bought a soft toy rat from a local well known animal accessories shop.

Product:

Soft Toy Rat

Cost: £5.99

Date Bought: July 2018

Brief Description:

A soft toy in the shape of a rat. There is a small squeaker in the body.

Review:

Well quite unsurprisingly the actual squeaky part of the squeaker lasted mere seconds. In fact I was given the rat as I got out of the car and the squeaker was de squeaked before I reached the front door. BOL! The rest of the toy was good to play with. It was a bit lightweight for throwing so no good for knocking things over.

The material was okay but the design was a bit flimsy as the stitching came apart with a few gentle flicks. Okay so some huge shaking! Although it was a disappointment it started falling apart with the shaking.

After a couple of days of my human sewing it back together after I barely played with it, I decided to put both it and my human out of their misery and shred the toy rat.

Rating: 2/10 Paws

To look at it was great as it looked like a rat and I thought I would have hours of fun with it I loved the squeaky in it until it broke.

As a soft toy is was not really well stitched together. Even with a determined lurcher playing with it, it should not have just given away at the seams so easily.
