Ross had his big, or should that be, bug break when he was invited to go on Dragons Den.

He managed to get an offer from Touker Suleyman. Unfortunately after the show, the offer never happened as they could not agree with the business's future direction.

Ross was not deterred. He carried on and managed to launch his Bug Bake Treats.

The treats are cold pressed and compatible with both raw and non raw fed dogs. November marks another special date in his calendar. On the 2nd of November to be exact. Bug

Bakes will launch a nutritious, cold pressed eco food for your dog!

Their food will use sustainable insects protein, nutritious fruits and vegetables, while using 100% plastic free packaging.

At launch Bug Bakes will have two varieties of food which are both suitable for all breeds of adult dog.

Recipe 1 - Regular

Insect Meal (mealworm) 28%, Barley 27%, Oats 13%, Sunflower Oil 5%, Apple 4%, Carrot 4%, Linseed 4%, Beet Pulp 4%, Vegetable Gravy 4%, Minerals, Vitamins, Brewers Yeast 1%, Seaweed 1%, Blueberry, Prebiotic MOS, Chicory Root Extract, Glucosamine 400mg/kg, Chondroitin 200mg/kg.

354kcal/100g, Protein 28%, Fat 11%, Fibre 5%, Ash 7%

Recipe 2 - Grain Free

Insect Meal (mealworm) 28%, Potato 27%, Peas 13%, Sunflower Oil 5%, Apple 4%, Carrot 4%, Linseed 4%, Beet Pulp 4%, Vegetable Gravy 4%,

Minerals, Vitamins, Brewers Yeast 1%, Seaweed 1%, Blueberry, Prebiotic MOS, Chicory Root Extract, Glucosamine 400mg/kg, Chondroitin 200mg/kg.

356kcal/100g, Protein 28%, Fat 11%, Fibre 5%, Ash 6%

As well as insect protein, they will be using fruits and veggies that are not only super healthy, but sourced sustainably too.

These foods will be cold pressed, meaning they can be fed dry or wet - simply add water for the latter. The packaging will be plant based fully compostable 2.5kg bags. No plastics or 'bio-plastics'.

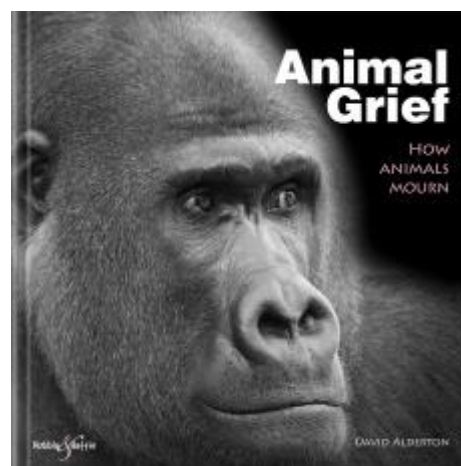

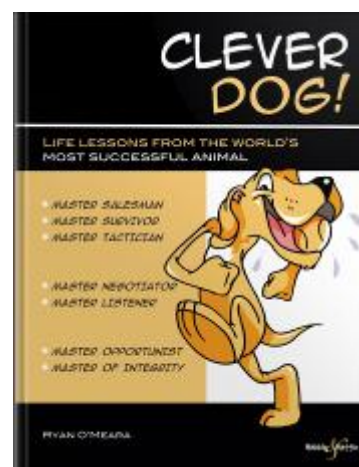

So, our planned doggy apple crumble is now.....

Apple Mumble Mix (four portions)

Ingredients:

2 tbsp water

50g jumbo porridge oats

1/2 tbsp coconut oil

Method:

1 In a medium pan cook the apple and water, over a low heat, until the apple is soft (approx 5 mins). Set aside in a bowl to cool.

2 In the same pan (once rinsed), add the oats and oil and mix. Cook over a low heat until warmed through (approx 5 mins) and let it cool.

3 Once both cooled, mix them together and tuck in.

Storage:

You get four portions and it will keep in a fridge for a couple of days.

CURRENT BILLS UNDER DISCUSSION IN UK PARLIAMENT

Animal Welfare (Sentencing) Bill.

The current law states that any human found guilty of animal cruelty can face up to six months in prison.

The Government is reviewing the proposal to change it so that humans found guilty will face up to five years in prison.

The second reading was heard in the House of Commons on the 23rd October 2020.

It is good that proper penalties are being reviewed, but it will still be a while before the amendment can be passed as new legislation.

What is the difference between Act and a Bill?

An Act is a law that contains any rules of how the law must be carried out and a guideline as to the penalties, both financial and custodial, for breaking the law.

A Bill is a draft Act that is either proposed and about to be reviewed or currently in the process of being reviewed by the Government.

How long does it take for a Bill to become an Act?

This all depends of what the Bill/ Act is about. Normally it could take up to three months, but some Bills/Acts can take longer if there a lot of objections or requests for amendments during the review process.

It is quite common for there to be over 100 Bills passing through Parliament each year.

What is the process?

The process of a Bill becoming an Act is quite a lengthy one.

1. First Reading (Commons)

A bill is first mentioned in Parliament

- This makes an official print of the Bill. It now exists as a Bill.

2. Second Reading (Commons)

It is discussed in Parliament and decided if it is a Bill and allowed to proceed.

- discussion and objections can occur during this reading.

3. Committee Stage. (Commons)

The Bill is studied in detail and every line is discussed approved or amended.

- If there has been changes it will be reprinted with all of the amendments.

4. Report Stage. Commons

This is where the Bill is discussed again after all the changes that occurred in the Committee Stage.

5. Third Reading (Commons)

This is more of a formality to vote on approval of the Bill.
- no amendments are allowed at this stage.

6. First Reading (Lords)

The Bill is first read out in the House of Lords.

- It is printed and proceeds to the next stage.

7. Second Reading (Lords)

It is Discussed in the House of Lords and any areas of concern will be discussed and/or amended.

8. Committee Stage (Lords)

The Bill is studied in detail and every line is discussed and if necessary amended and then voted on.

- If there has been amendments, the Bill is printed

9. Report Stage. (Lords)

The Bill is discussed again after all the amendments.

- Further amendments are allowed at this stage.

10. Third Reading (Lords)

Third reading in the Lords is the chance to concentrate on making sure the law is effective and workable, without loopholes.

11. Consideration of Amendments.

This is where the Bill is passed back to the House of Commons for a final check. Any amendments and the Bill could go between the House of Commons and the House of Lords until everything is amended and agreed.

- The House of Commons Can use an Act of Parliament to approve a Bill if the House of the Bill has been passed between them and the Lords cannot agree with the House of Commons.

12. Royal Assent

Once Parliament is ready to make the Bill into a law (Act) it is given to the Monarchy to give the Bill Royal Assent, this officially changes the Bill into an Act, making it a law.

TRAINING - BARKING

Barking is always a strange subject with humans. They expect us to be totally silent, yet they bark to other humans all of the time. They call their barks speaking, but it is the same thing.

Why do we bark?

We can bark for loads of different reasons and believe it or not we actually do have different barks for different situations. Humans forget that they have a vast language that they are familiar with and can communicate in depth with other humans. We also have a very in depth range of vocabulary for us to communicate with dogs, other animals and even humans.

If humans took a bit of time to study our barking, they would learn to understand what we are barking at.

Reasons we would bark:

- Fear
- Anger
- Loneliness
- Tiredness
- Hunger
- Play
- Greeting
- Warning
- Communication
- Pain
- Arguing
- Someone at the door

There are loads of other reasons we bark. These are just the most common ones.

I have taught my humans several of my barks.

They have learnt my barks for:

- Pain
- Anger
- Frustration
- Open the door
- Treat time
- Stranger approaching the house
- Chatting with my friends
- Cat alert
- Arguing
- Play time

There are more but I cannot think of them at the minute. My humans have been good students and learnt quite quickly.

Should we be allowed to bark?

That would depend of the bark and how long we bark for.

For example my barks are really short, so I rarely get told to be quiet. Although over excited play barks are frowned upon very early in the morning or late at night. BOL!

Dogs should be allowed to express themselves to some degree, but not to the point the whole neighbourhood is sick of hearing them.

Any dog barking should bark for a reason and not just for the sake of hearing their own bark.

With training, for both the human and the dog, an understanding of each dog's bark should be learnt and

either allowed, controlled or stopped.

Can barking be controlled or stopped?

Yes. All dogs should be taught the appropriate time and duration of some barking. It takes a lot of work for the human to learn about barking and how to control it.

Here are two examples:

A dog barks apparently agitated at the back door.

The human must get up to 'help' to find out the reason for the barking. If it was due to something making a noise, such as a plastic bag rustling in the wind, the human should allow the dog to investigate and reassure the dog.

A dog barks excitedly at their human while bringing a toy to them.

The dog is trying to instigate play and is being quite vocal about it. The human must first acknowledge the game and ask for the barking to stop. The human and dog should play for a while until the human tells the dog it is rest time.

I have skipped over a few training points and have assumed the human has learnt these already. If not, it is something that will be fun for both the dog and human to learn together.

My pawrents bought me a 'Fred Mobile 2020' from the jungle website and whilst I was being pushed around in it, I thought I would do a review.

Brief Description: The IREENUO dog stroller is designed for injured, old or sick dogs. For easy storage and transport, the stroller folds down. The stroller is designed for medium and large dogs with a max load of 60kg

Review: Whilst I am willing to walk for miles, my bones can't manage to walk for long. We were due to go for our annual holiday to Warkworth, but Mum and Dad wondered how I would cope with not being able to walk far.

I did some research and selected the IREENUO Dog



Stroller. The stroller was also recommended by Ernie the Spaniel's mum, Nicole, so we decided to order it. Dad said the stroller was relatively easy to figure out how to build it, and a dawdle when you know what you are doing.

With the 360 rotatable front wheels and large rear wheels, the stroller adapts to different types of surfaces very well. Dad said push the stroller as a wheelchair rather than a pram and if the kerb is not dropped then you have to pull the stroller backwards over the kerb. Nicole also mentioned that the stroller can be attached to a push bike. The stroller does take up room in the boot of the car.

We used the stroller every day and Mum and Dad said it was worth the money. We went round, Amble and Alnwick in the rain and whilst the stroller isn't waterproof, I was not too wet and didn't end up looking

like 'drowned rats' as Mum, Dad and Tess did. The main structure of the stroller is made from high-strength stainless steel tube and PVC fabric. The stroller is anti-vibration and provides shock absorption and good stability. For comfort, Mum bought me a dog bed to lie on inside.

The stroller has big windows which allows you to say hello and get treats. It also has storage pockets at the back for treats. The stroller is roomy inside. Mum would put some of her shopping inside, though she didn't believe me when I said I wouldn't eat the pies and scones from the market!

Whilst the stroller was bought for our holiday, Mum and Dad said we will also use it when needed at home.

Rating: 9/10 Paws (it would get 10 but we have only used it for a week).

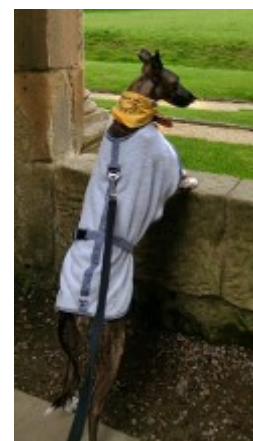

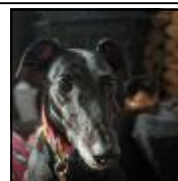

THE NINE STONES - DORSET



The Nine Stones DT2 9LX

About:

Seven of the stones are under 1 metre (3 feet) high, although as they are all partially buried they may be larger than the exposed parts suggest.

Two larger stones on the north-west side of the circle are about 1.5 metres (5 feet) high and 1.5 metres wide. The stones are roughly spaced at 1m intervals around the circle, though there is a gap of 3 metres (10 feet) between the two larger stones suggesting a possible entrance.

Stone circles are found throughout England. They are concentrated in upland areas such as Bodmin Moor,

Dartmoor and the Lake District, although this may not reflect their original distribution.

Where excavated, they have been found to date from the late Neolithic to middle Bronze Age (about 2500–1000 BC). All are carefully laid out, with the stones regularly spaced.

Although it is not fully understood why they were built or how they were used, it is clear that they had ritual importance for the people who used them: in many cases, excavation has revealed evidence of burials and associated rituals.

Some seem to have been carefully aligned so as to help

mark the passage of time and the seasons.

The Nine Stones is one of only four stone circles to survive in south Dorset, and its location in a valley bottom is very unusual.

KINGSTON RUSSELL STONE CIRCLE - DORSET

The 18 visible stones at Kingston Russell have all fallen: they lie flat, in a big irregular oval, the diameter of which varies between 27 metres (90 feet) and 18 metres (60 feet).

Some are broken, and it is impossible to tell which fragments are bases and which were originally upper parts. Ploughing has also disturbed the site. None of the stones has been shaped in any way, but they may have been set up with the tallest to the north.

While we can never expect to know exactly what went on within such circles, the study of more recent primitive societies suggests that structures like this may have been put to a great variety of uses, such as religious ceremonies and calendar setting. They

may have served as the setting for community decision-making, dynastic marriages, inter-community trading agreements and the settling of frontier disputes.

Back along the footpath towards the road you pass the remains of a much earlier Neolithic chambered tomb known as the Grey Mare and Her Colts, showing that this area of chalk downland had been a focus for community ceremonies for at least one thousand years before the stone circle was erected.

Today, Kingston Russell Stone Circle lies at the junction of five footpaths, an echo of its ancient significance. **Parking:** There is limited parking on the grass verge just beyond the cattle grid on the lane which leads to Gorwell Farm.

Nearby Abbotsbury has public toilets, shops and places to eat.

Notes:

The site is very remote and exposed with no shelter. The track to the stone circle is in regular use by farm vehicles and can be very muddy in wet weather. We advise you to wear sturdy waterproof footwear.
