Despite dogs going missing every day humans are still popping into stores during our walks or worse, only taking us to the store.


Not only can this be distressing for us dogs, it can be dangerous. We can be get injured , lost, stolen, or even attacked while alone out there.

They say we are their 'furbabies' and 'precious' but I don't see them leaving small humans or leaving some other valuable thing out there. Now we need to educate humans about this.


Either they go to the store some other time when we are not with them or they go for a walk in groups so that there is always a human outside looking after us dogs.

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HISTORY OF A RABBIT

Rabbits existed 55 million years ago, well a rabbit type animal called a Gomphos Elkema. They were first discovered by humans around 1200BC by sailors sailing around the Mediterranean coast.

In 200BC the Romans were the first to domesticate rabbits. Although they used rabbits for their meat and fur they were held in high regard. They even added rabbits into their artwork and mosaics, an emperor even had one on a coin. The Romans brought rabbits with them when they invaded in 43AD.

In the 5th Century French monks living in Champagne are thought to be the first to truly domesticate rabbits. By keeping the rabbits within the monastery walls they were able to selectively breed so they could change the rabbits colours and size.

In the 12th Century in Britain some were bred into long haired rabbits which meant the fur could be used without the need to kill the rabbit.

During this time other regions and countries were selectively breeding rabbits, which is why there are such a large variety of domesticated rabbits today.

Although it is common for humans to believe house or indoor rabbits are a new thing but in fact it was the Victorians that started keeping rabbits as pets to show them off as a curiosity and at exhibitions. They would have kept rabbits in the nursery or outside for their children to have as pets. Victorians still kept some rabbits for their meat.

Today it is unknown exactly the number of domesticated rabbit breeds which can live up to 12 years, depending on breed.

TIGGER VISITS... A DOGGY DAYCARE

Doggy Daycare has been around for at least 30 years in the USA and at least 10 years in the UK.

With more humans choosing a dog to be part of their family there was an noticeable increase of demand for accessories, toys and dog friendly venues being required. Also there was a growing fact that many dogs were being left alone at home for hours on end. Sometimes ending up with destroyed furniture or mess due to no one being home to let the dog out.

Businesses started appearing to cater for this gap in the market. Such as dog walkers and house sitters.

Then someone dreamt up the idea to start boarding dogs during the day and not just for the duration their humans went away on holiday.

This meant that dogs were not being left alone for hours and were kennelled during the day where they were fed, walked and had play times with the humans to hand for any needs of the dogs.

Eventually someone went that step further and instead of each dog being in its own kennelled area, the dogs (with careful introductions) were allowed to play together which was the beginnings of the daycare everyone sees today.

Daycares theses days do still have zones but that is more for separating out the small, large and elderly dogs.

Figures show that humans spend approximately £1.5 Billion a year on dog walkers and daycare.

After all of this research I realised I have never been to a doggy daycare . So I visited Canine Camp Ltd to see what it was all about.

First of all my human let the side down by getting lost. You just can't get the staff these days, how embarrassing. We eventually arrived. There are plenty of spaces for parking, so there was no problem there...if you ignore my human's attempt at parking BOL !

We entered into the small reception hall and were greeted by one of the human staff, Emma, who booking me in as a VIP visitor.

Entering through a gate I was met by the other two human staff there called Cheryl and Georgie. I was pleased to see them but soon saw the one I was here to see and interview – Monty, who is an Australian Shepherd, was waiting in the play pen area for me and I went over to talk to him. I asked him about Canine Camp and how it came about. He explained that his human, Cheryl, had always wanted to set up a doggy daycare as their house was a holiday home for dogs when she was growing up so was used to seeing and interacting with all types of dogs and knew the work involved in caring for them.

They looked at setting up Canine Camp in August 2016 and after researching sites, getting through all of the council rules and other things they needed they opened their doors on 17th June 2017. They can cater for up to 30 dogs at the same time with a staff to dog ratio of not more than 1 staff member to 5 dogs to ensure everyone's needs are catered for properly. There are plans to expand with training, grooming and are hoping to have more Canine Camps in other areas.

Monty told me to have a look around to see what I thought while he went to get his staff to make my human a coffee.

Inside there are three main areas that have a nice white picket type fence about 3 feet tall. Unfortunately the fencing has been put close together SO I couldn't get my pointy nose in between the fencing. This is good to stop any small dogs squeezing through but no good for any games of bitey face through the fence.

I went into the peaceful pen area where there was a nice selection of beds to choose from and a good selection of toys scattered around.

The floor in there is similar to the type at a veterinary practice and yes it is easy clean as I tested it out myself, much to the embarrassment of my human. That will teach them to get lost on the way to a meeting BOL !

The playful pen where I met Monty has that fake grass on it so zoomies can be achieved without sliding around too much and there were more toys scattered around. There are a few obstacles to explore and climb on or under.

The outside area has a huge fence that even a very determined dog would have trouble getting over it as it is about 10 feet tall.

There are several bolted gates along the fencing for staff to enter or exit quickly if needed. I quite like the feeling of being in an indoor park as there are no cages or metal fencing and it feels well lit and very relaxing.

The human staff members are very attentive and ready to play and give cuddles if you want.

Every dog gets walked on lead

outside every visit to ensure they get some proper exercise and fresh air.

I asked Monty if it was okay to have a picture taken with him before I left and he agreed as long as we made it as difficult as possible for the humans to get us pointed in the same direction at the same time.

So we took turns moving and turning our heads just as the photograph was being taken. So after several failed photographs we let the human take the photo. If you are looking for some pawsome daycare to go to as they are perfectly located if your human works nearby as they can drop you off on the way to work and pick you up on the way home or if you just want a few hours rest from your humans then this is a great place to consider.

Toy and Games Reviews Games to play with your Humans

King/queen of the sofa.

Rules:

The aim of the game is to get overall control of the sofa.

If the sofa is empty jump up and lie in the middle and stretch out in both directions to claim the sofa.

TOY REVIEW - TREAT BALL

Toy: Treat Ball Cost: £6.99 Date Bought: February 2015

Brief Description:

Bright green heavy duty thick rubber ball with a hole on each side. Where the holes are, there are flappy bits of thinner rubber that stop all of the treats falling out.

Review:

Apart from the sides where I may or may not have chewed away the rubber I am happy to say this toy has been the longest surviving toy I have had. It can be used as a treat diepenser or just a regular throw ball. I must admit the hole make it another great sound amplifier for woo wooing at my humans.

Even though I have added my own artistic style and chewed (allegedly) the ends, I have been unable to chew through to the treat compartment, so the functionality has not been affected.

I would however suggest only putting dired treats into it as it would get messy and it's not the right shape to get wet food out of. It is fully waterproof as it has landed in my water bowl and the kitchen sink a few times while being thrown about.

Overall Tigger Rating:

I would give this toy 10 out of 10.

This toy could almost be stamped Tigger proof on the destruction scale.



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First of all I would like to point out I am not advising on any particular method of immunisation,

I am merely investigation what Titre Testing is and trying to give as much information as possible about everything I discovered during my research. So no going to your vet and saying "Tigger said..."

A background into vaccines

There are approximately 316 veterinary vaccines or immunological products currently in the UK for companion animals, horses and the major food producing animals.

46 are authorised for use in dogs and 30 products are authorised for cats.

For dogs...which will be the focus of my investigation, there are two main groups of vaccine which are Core and Non-Core vaccines.

Core vaccines are vaccines that all dogs should be protected against.

Non-core vaccines are vaccines for animals whose geographical location, local environment or lifestyle places them at risk of contracting other specific infections. The WSAVA (World Small Ani-

mal Veterinary Association) guidelines also classify some vaccines as not recommended where they believe there is insufficient scientific evidence to justify their use. However, they may still be used where the diseases they intend to immunise against have a particular clinical significance - outbreak.

The three Core vaccines are:

1. Canine Distemper Virus (CDV)

- 2. Canine Parvovirus (CPV)
- 3. Canine Adenovirus (CAV)

The initial vaccines.

When a puppy is born it is partially protected from infections from its mother's milk. However this limited protection will only last for a few weeks so it is important to arrange vaccination as soon as possible. The first vaccination is usually given in two stages which are around eight weeks and around two weeks after the initial one. It will be safe for the puppy to go out seven days after the second vaccine. Exact dates and schedules will be confirmed by your veterinary practice.

The WSAVA recommend a 12 month booster to ensure immunity for dogs that may not have adequately responded to the primary puppy vaccination course.

Duration of immunity

Studies to determine duration of immunity (DOI) can be carried out but the studies would need to recruit a large number of dogs and continue following each of these dogs for several years. The studies are likely to be very expensive and there is a high potential of 'loss to follow-up' (e.g. owners moving house, dropping out of the study) and would rely heavily on the use of questionnaires and accurate records.

One significant factor would be if a dog has been vaccinated and is then exposed to a disease it could affect the perceived DOI in the study. Further information about the dog's breed, location and lifestyle etc would need to be considered, so giving any vaccine a guaranteed DOI is not realistically possible or accurate to say for every dog out there at this time.

The DOI established through research (controlled environment) is a minimum period of duration and may be much longer. However to establish the maximum DOI it would require animals to be isolated for very long periods of time and this raises considerable concerns about animal welfare, veterinary ethics and cost.

TITRE TESTING (CONTINUED)

The WSAVA Guidelines recommend a booster at 12 months after completing the primary vaccination for all corecomponents (defined as canine distemper, parvovirus and adenovirus) followed by a booster vaccination frequency of not more than every three years.

Titre Testing

What is Titre testing? Serology is the process of taking a blood sample and diluting it to check its antibody level. The process of diluting and studying is called titration, which is why it has probably got the name Titre test. The reason for getting a Titre test is to see a particular animal's antibody level and see if it requires a booster.

What is better, booster or Tire test?

That my dear furpals is not for me to say, Vets study hard for over 4 years to get qualifications and can answer these questions, whereas I can lie on the floor and scratch behind my ear with my paw. The only thing I can recommend is that your welfare is properly taken care of and whatever route your humans decide make sure they ask your vet and research it thoroughly themselves.

External factors to consider

The following factors do not directly influence your health but point out some things to consider and check before deciding on Titre testing.

Boarding, daycare and training classes

All of these establishments require proof of immunisation. They will quote the Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963, yes even the training classes as all of their licences are approved, issued and checked by local councils.

They may say dogs require vaccines, but the Act states "that all reasonable precautions will be taken to prevent and control the spread among animals of infectious or contagious diseases".

A Titre test showing acceptable immunity levels is proof of immunisation.

Some establishments will accept annual Titre testing results that show acceptable immunity levels but some may not. If you use these establishments it is better to check their policies.

Insurance


Animals that do not have annual boosters may find they are not covered for some illnesses if they could have been vaccinated against in the annual booster. It is better to check your policy to see what is said about vaccines.

Within an urban district, quietly nestled amongst fully established trees, Cupcake Lane is what used to be the local train station from a bygone era.

There is a large free carpark behind the station.

Teas are served in china cups to complete the vintage feel of the place. (other hot drinks are served too)

There is seating indoors and outside along the platform there are a lot more seats with throws and blankets are placed on the seats or you to sit on or wrap around yourself if it is a little bit cooler. At busy times there can be a bit of a wait but it is worth waiting for.

Food:

As the name suggests there is an abundance of cupcakes.

They do a good cooked breakfast and a home cooked lunch selection.

There is also a selection of sandwiches and savouries.

You can order afternoon tea with various cakes and pastries.

They have a good selection of gluten free food too.

Dogs access:
