CHARITY OPENS NEW STORE IN NORTHUMBERLAND

Safe Homes and Kindness, SHAK, has opened a store in Blyth, Northumberland.

SHAK isn't like any other dog charity, they are different because they help the dogs that really need it the most.

They are not a re-homing centre like most animal charities, instead they offer sanctuary to abused, mistreated and neglected dogs that have suffered so badly at the hands of humans that they need somewhere to start their lives all over again.

SHAK are a non public facing charity, meaning we are not open to the public to visit the kennels, nor do they take dogs from members of the public.

All dogs are either strays or destruction cases from vets or pounds.

SHAK do not actively seek homes for the dogs. After spending time in their care, some of the dogs move onto other more breed specific specialised Charities or are fostered through their own Forever Foster scheme.

However, some are so badly

damaged that the only option they have is to stay with SHAK for the rest of their lives where they will be given love, care, playtimes and sometimes life long medication for any health issues or injuries they arrive with.

This is why the opening of their store is so important.

It is not only a way to raise much needed funds for the dogs, but it also serves as an important information hub which raises public knowledge of the charity and what it does.

There is also a drop off box in the store. Here visitors can drop off items for the dogs.

Items that can be dropped off are:

- Tinned dog food
- Dried dog food
- Dog treats
- Dog toys
- Blankets
- Towels

ON THE BOOKSHELF


An Armful of Animals


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Pets Aplenty

Well, there have been several times when Bossman has played the fool, intentionally or otherwise.


But one stands out in particular.

IN THE KITCHEN

This month's recipes are both from us.

We apologised for the lack of pictures as our human was not quick enough with the camera before tasting started BOL!

Liver cake**Ingredients:**

Pack of liver

Equal amounts to the weight of the liver of Self Raising Flour (can use plain which makes it really dense)

3 eggs

oil or milk

Method:

Preheat oven to 180 fan.

Put the liver in a food processor & blend, add the eggs and blend again.

In a separate bowl add the flour and pour the liver and egg mixture into the

flour and mix well.

You want the consistency to be really gloopy so at this stage add oil or milk to get the right consistency.

Tip the mixture onto a baking tray and bake for 25 -30 minutes, until lightly browner on top.

Remove from the oven and let it cool down.

Once cool, cut the cake into bite size pieces.

Storage:

The cake can be kept in a sealed tub in the fridge for about a week or frozen.

Cheesy Puffs**Ingredients:**

100g grated parmesan or similar cheese

150g cottage cheese

300 plain flour

2 tbsp oil

Preparation:

Preheat oven to 180 fan.

Put all the ingredients into a mixer and

mix well using the dough hooks.

Mould little portions of the mixture and place on the baking sheets.

Bake for 20 minutes and then turn off the oven and keep the biscuits in the oven until the oven is cold.

Storage:

Store in a tub in the fridge for up to 3 weeks.

WINTER PAW CARE AND SAFETY

As winter approaches you need to be reminding your humans to take a bit of time to think about you and your paws.

This is not only directed at dogs, it is directed to all animals that may go out or be exposed to outdoor clothing/shoes.

There are a few vital things your humans need to know:

Frost/ice snow.

Although we can walk outside in most weather conditions and our humans usually forget to think about us during the 'nice walk' across various surfaces.

Along with the freezing surfaces, there is also the sharp ice. Not to mention any dangers hidden under the snow and ice.

When we are off lead zooming round, care should be taken to ensure we don't hurt ourselves by slipping or over extending ourselves when we are cold.

They need to be

constantly reminded that we can suffer from toxic poisoning, frostbite, ice burns and cracked paws which could lead not only to pain, infections but also in some cases – death !!

Antifreeze/screen wash for vehicles.

This is very poisonous to us and even though it is poisonous, there is an ingredient (ethylene glycol) in the antifreeze that makes animals (and small humans) attracted to it.

Now I am not expecting you to remind your humans to top up their cars, but for you to remind them that if they spill any on the ground or on their shoes they need to clear it up.

Better still ,if it is possible, store their shoes where you cannot reach them and to take them off before walking through the house.

Road grit/salt

This is poisonous for us. We are not attracted to it by smell, we walk on it and it gets in between our

toes.

Some of us may be sensitive to it and get skin irritation.

So once we are able to, we lick our paws to get rid of the grit.

If after all your attempts to educate your humans they still do not take necessary precautions during winter refuse to leave the house, or better still shout 'HUGE VET BILLS'

Remind them to:

- Check your paws for cracks/cuts and ice.
- Clean/wash your paws after a walk.
- Ensure you are wrapped up well when going for walks, but making sure you don't overheat too.
- Take care with liquids when topping up their vehicles.
